## **MESSAGE FROM SDC**

On behalf of Stark Development Corporation (SDC) we are very pleased to present to you our 2017 Annual Report. This past year has been a productive year for us as we continue to build and re-imagine the role of SDC in Dickinson and Stark County. We have created a new strategic plan targeting innovation and expansion within our businesses and entrepreneurs, recruiting and retaining a skilled workforce and strengthening our relationship with our members and the business community.

In 2017 we have helped our members in over \$6.5 million in capital investments creating additional and better paying career opportunities within our community. We are actively trying to stimulate and grow our entrepreneurial community. Partnering with Dickinson State University and the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) we held the first 3 Day Startup weekend this year. Through the SBDC's efforts, we saw an additional six business starts and over \$500,000 in capital formed.

We successfully launched our Community Development Program, offering a one-to-one match up to \$25,000 targeting façade improvement, historical preservation and retail expansion. Two projects have been approved and substantial interest has been expressed as that program gains momentum in our area.

In alignment with the vision of Governor Burgum, the City and the Downtown Dickinson Association are actively participating in the city's downtown task-force. Vibrant communities, especially attractive and inviting downtowns, are often credited as key factors in successful workforce recruitment and retention efforts nationwide. We have a tremendous opportunity to work together and re-imagine the possibilities for our community and create an action plan for progress.

2017 was a year of relationship building and creating a strong network of partners. While current projects and programs continue to grow, we are excited to develop new projects, programs and relationships along the way. We thank you all for your efforts and look forward to an equally productive 2018.



## EDND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AWARD

ABLE Inc. and Stark Development Corporation received the Economic Development Association of North Dakota (EDND) Impact Award for Community Development during the EDND Fall Conference Oct. 19 in Williston.

The Community Development Award recognizes an economic development project that has increased the quality of life in a community. ABLE Inc. is a nonprofit organization serving Southwest North Dakota with locations in Dickinson, Bowman and Hettinger. For more than 30 years, they have been providing housing to men and women with intellectual disabilities by leasing homes for them and providing direct support professionals and nurses. Currently ABLE Inc. supports nearly 100 people and employs approximately 170 support staff. A few years ago, they learned the group homes they leased were expiring and would be nonrenewable in the long term. This gave ABLE Inc. the opportunity and the challenge of designing and overseeing the construction of four new homes to replace the leased homes. The new homes were built to last a century and to provide specialized care. One of their major goals was to create an inviting space for the people, their families and friends. ABLE Inc. recently completed the four group homes in Dickinson, housing 24 residents and crafted specifically to assist those with special needs. Stark Development Corporation helped support this project with an affordable housing grant.

## **ENTREPRENEURIAL RESOURCES**

2017 at the Dickinson SBDC office was highlighted by the following three significant elements:

#### LAUNCH

The re-launching of a Dickinson-based office on the campus of Dickinson State University was the first major step toward reinvigorating the SBDC presence in Dickinson. Establishing the physical presence both on-campus and a satellite kiosk at Stark Development Corporation was the first step in the process. Collaboration with Stark has been key to a smooth reintroduction of SBDC services in the area. A large tablet is available at the Stark Development kiosk, where potential clients can sign up for services without the SBDC counselor present. This has led to numerous referrals back and forth between SDC and the SBDC.

#### **OUTREACH**

Reaching out to the community and lenders in the region was the first outreach effort. Presenting at local meetings like the Manufacturer's Round Table and Kiwanis Club, allowed for the SBDC to be reintroduced to community leadership. One-on-Ones with local lenders and insurance providers opened another touch point for future clientele. Lastly, university publicity and public relations support found our center in the news a few times throughout the year, further boosting the awareness of our services.



#### SMALL BUSINESS SUPPORT

Although, initially slow, our numbers are comparable to previous years when factoring in the half-time status of the SBDC counselor. We had quite a few business starts and some promising large ventures on the horizon. Our special project was a unique 3 Day Startup Weekend available to Dickinson residents and the surrounding communities. Twelve aspiring entrepreneurs spent 3 intense days coming up with large, scalable ideas and refining them within their groups. The event culminated in a final pitch in front of a distinguished judging panel. This was a collaborative event hosted by the SBDC, Stark development Corporation, and Dickinson State University. Participants were students, community members, and a few from other parts of the state. The judging panel consisted of our Ryan Jilek, Scott Decker, and the Chair of DSU's School of Business and Entrepreneurship. The event was facilitated by Austin, Texas-based 3 Day Startup.


